N.C. Teacher Pay Facts

N.C. ranked #1 in the U.S. for fastest rising teacher pay in 2017 according to the NEA.

North Carolina ranked #2 in the U.S. for fastest rising teacher pay in 2018 according to the NEA.

Half of N.C. teachers – over 44,000 – will receive at least a \$10,000 raise since 2014 in current state budget.

More than 18,000 teachers will receive at least a \$14,000 raise since 2014 in the current state budget.

A teacher with <u>5 years of experience</u> will earn \$9,200 more since 2014, from \$30,800 to \$40,000, a 29.9% increase.

A teacher with <u>12 years of experience</u> will earn \$15,330 more since 2014, from \$31,670 to \$47,000, a 48% increase.

A teacher with <u>17 years of experience</u> will earn \$11,840 more since 2014, \$38,160 to \$50,000, a 31% increase.

A teacher with <u>25 years of experience</u> will earn \$9,040 more since 2014, from \$42,260 to \$51,300, a 21.4% increase.



Teacher Pay Increases in North Carolina


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N.C. Education Funding Facts

North Carolina K-12 spending declined 2008-2011. Democrats cut pay, froze salaries, furloughed teachers.

Since 2011, North Carolina Republicans increased K-12 spending by hundreds of millions every year.

The 2017-2018 state budget increased funding for K-12 education by nearly \$700 million over two years.



North Carolina spends over two billion dollars more – every year – on K-12 education than in 2010-2011.

Per-pupil spending increased each of the last 3 years.

North Carolina ranked #14 for percentage of state budget spent on K-12 education in 2018 NEA data.

Asst. principal salaries increased an average of 13%, principal salaries 9%, in 2017-18 state budget.

Average teacher pay raise since 2014: \$8,600, 19.1%.

Average teacher pay raise since 2017: \$4,412, 9.5%.

The 2018 state budget marks the 5th consecutive pay raise provided to North Carolina teachers.

Frequently Asked Questions about North Carolina's Rising Teacher Pay

The Governor's budget raises teacher pay more than the Republican plan...

- The governor's budget threatens our economic success by raising taxes.
- Republicans don't have to raise taxes to raise teacher pay.
- We have kept the promise of a long-term teacher pay raise plan over 5 years.
- The governor wants to take us back to higher taxes and slower growth.
- Republicans have raised teacher pay 19% over 5 years while lowering taxes.
- Republicans have a smarter spending plan that doesn't play politics.
- Our budget plan is stable and sustainable for the long-term.
- The governor's budget spends nearly everything available bad practice.
- The governor's budget adds \$1.5 billion in recurring spending.
- That's \$500 million more than the recurring revenue available.
- The governor's budget leads to a deficit and require more tax increases.

The Governor makes corporations pay more for teacher pay raises...

- This is a budget gimmick for the press, not a serious spending plan.
- The governor shouldn't play politics with the state budget this way.
- North Carolina needs serious, long-term investments like what we've made.
- Critics of tax cuts were proven wrong by our state's revenue surpluses..
- North Carolina has revenue surpluses and record reserves after tax relief.
- Our budget is built for North Carolina's long-term competitiveness.

Adjusted for inflation, N.C. teacher pay today is still 9%-10% less than in 2008...

- Using 2008 as a baseline ignores the recession that followed.
- The recession led to a massive decrease in education spending by Democrats.
- It took years for tax revenues to return to pre-recession levels.
- Medicaid shortfalls from 2011 to 2014 diverted billions from public schools.
- Republicans have fixed the Medicaid shortfalls like we are fixing teacher pay.

North Carolina is 39th in per-pupil spending and 37th in teacher pay.

- What matters most is growth.
- Before Republicans turned things around, teacher pay was cut, teacher salaries were frozen, and North Carolina had a \$2.8 billion debt under Democrat control.
- North Carolina has ranked top-2 for teacher pay growth two years in a row.
- North Carolina's rankings are rising rapidly in total spending and teacher pay.
- Republicans spend more on education today than at any time in history.
- Republicans successfully increased investments our approach is working.
- Our state is on a solid financial foundation.
- We paid off debt, saved a record reserve, and are running revenue surpluses.
- North Carolina is well-positioned to continue rising in the rankings under Republican control with a balanced approach that encourages growth.
- North Carolina is a rapidly growing state a good thing.
- Rapid population growth drives down per-pupil expenditures short-term.
